

# **INEX BINGO**



We were lucky that we could do a weekend workcamp. Together with Kika, we lead a camp in Licartovce/Obisovce. The volunteering camp was about renovating and building the castle. 


The other camp was a virtual camp about comic strips and movie analyses.








Fake it until you make it, haha



It was not as easy as I thought. First, you have to do some research on a topic you prefer. Then you have to structure the knowledge and think of how to create interaction with the audience. As of last, you have to test it and adapt it to the changes. The topic I chose was Cultural Awareness because it is a topic close to my heart. I grew up with two different cultures and I wanted to create awareness that people come from different backgrounds. In total, I gave four workshops. Three of them were online and one was face to face at my camp. I could see the difference between online and real life. It is much easier to create interaction with the audience when you are face to face, you can adapt more to the situation.







One of the first things I noticed when I came to Bratislava that there are many homeless people living on the streets. At INEX, we also help other organisations out. During the office hours, we had the opportunity to volunteer at Malteszky Rad. We prepacked the cutlery in bags or we would fill the lunch bags with food products to the homeless people. It is good to be outside and give a little time for the people who need our support the most by simply giving a warm meal.










### Trainings





At my time here I did several trainings, we had the leadership training to become a camp leader, and the on arrival & midterm training.

The on arrival and midterm training were organised by Iuventa. These mandatory trainings are organised for ESC volunteers in Slovakia. Due to Corona they were held online through Zoom. The on-arrival training is to get to know each others projects and activities within their organisations. Also, we learned more about the European Solidarity Corps, our rights as volunteers and got more insights of Slovakia.

At the Midterm training, we met the same trainers and volunteers again. The idea of the last training is to update each other about our projects and evaluate on what we have learned. The training was helpful to better understand what things have been accomplished in such a short time frame. It was good to share it with the other volunteers. Also, we discussed what went well and what could be improved within projects. Overall, the trainings were of good value to the project.

The training to become a (camp) leader was helpful to be a prepared leader to go to a camp. We were lucky that Monika gave the sessions in real-life, and that made it easier to follow the interactive training. The training was divided into two parts. In the first part of the training, we divined the camp vocabulary, we were being taught the history of INEX and workcamps, The second part was about the financial book, how to cook for a bigger group and we had to do two exams to pass for the leadership training. It felt like good preparation for the actual volunteering camp.

The training was closed with an evaluation meeting which is named Potaborka. At this meeting, we did a few games, shared our experiences, lessons learned, and filled in for the last time the paper of the leadership competencies. It was good, to sum up and reflect on all the things learned during the training but also at the camp.





### Travel

Travelling, yes even I had the chance to travel before and during the pandemic. I went to Brno for a day trip and visited my parents in Austria. Austria became the meeting spot to see my parents because they were not allowed to enter Slovakia. However, my dad got the opportunity to visit me in Bratislava and to have some quality time together. Due to the lovely pandemic, I got to travel in Slovakia and visited many places like Zohor, Banská Štiavnica, Prievidza, Bojnice, Čičmany, Trenčín, Ličartovce, Košice, Liptovský Mikuláš, Žilina, Trnava, Nitra, and Pezinok. 


